Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

We have several new course offerings and updates to add in to our major requirements. Specifically,

- 1. Nationalism in Asia (ASIA 113) and Social Movements in Asia (ASIA 114) are new courses added into our curriculum. They are major requirement options in the 'culminating core' category to provide further understanding of the region comparatively. We also want to provide students with a few options for the required upper division courses in the major to ensure if a faculty is on leave or unable to offer other required courses, it does not create a barrier to students seeking to complete the major.
- 2. Asian Politics (POLS 145) and Seminar in Recent Interpretations of Asian History (HIST 192C) were double listed in 'culminating core' and electives. They are now removed from the 'culminating core' and remain in the 'Pan-Asia elective'. Non-ASIA coded courses do not generate FTEs for the major, so it was also beneficial to make all required courses offered by faculty tenured in the Program.

 3. Asian American Women (ETHN/WGS 118) appeared twice in our catalog list so we have streamlined to reflect it is a single course.

 4. Special Problems (ASIA 199) is a course code for a directed reading. It has not been included in the past since it was rarely used when we did not have tenure-track faculty in the Program. Obviously, it should count for major credit so it is now listed under the Pan-Asia category.

Our Asian Studies Program geographically encompasses East Asia (China/Taiwan, Japan, the Koreas, and Mongolia), Southeast Asia (Brunei, Cambodia, East Timor, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam), and South Asia (Afghanistan, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka). We offer in depth examinations of particular countries while also analyzing transnational issues that connect Asia, other regions, and the rest of the world including the United States. Students may also find interest in minors in Chinese Studies, Korean Studies and South and Southeast Asian Studies or in Chinese or Japanese language.

The major is designed to provide students with a coherent introduction to the language, history, and culture of these Asian societies and to develop an interdisciplinary understanding of the major social and political forces at work in the region, supported by appropriate language training. Graduates of the program either continue their studies at graduate institutions or utilize their knowledge and training through employment in government, business or education relating to this increasingly important region of the world.
