Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

The Liberal Studies Program is proposing a new Area of Emphasis in the BA Liberal Studies degree that aligns with requirements to obtain a Bilingual Authorization in Spanish. The Liberal Studies Council includes membership from Teaching Credentials faculty who oversee the EDUC curriculum that has been integrated into the Area of Emphasis. The Area of Emphasis curriculum was developed collaboratively between the Liberal Studies Council, Teaching Credentials program, and Student Success Center advisors in the College of Education.

This new Area of Emphasis clarifies the appropriate pathway for students seeking a Bilingual Authorization in Spanish, which was aligned with the Multicultural Studies Area of Emphasis. The new Area of Emphasis will allow students to complete the authorization requirements as an undergraduate student. Students may still complete this authorization as a post-baccalaureate student as before.

With this proposed change, the Liberal Studies Council is also incorporating Program Learning Outcomes that were approved in December 2023, in response to the Program Review conducted 2021-22 and subsequent Action Plan approved in Spring 2022. The BA in Liberal Studies major is a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC)-approved subject matter program for Multiple Subjects/Elementary Subject Matter. As such, there are specific curricular requirements in each of the broad areas in the major. A document of the domain areas and learning outcomes for each is attached, where the domain requirements for Multiple Subjects.

Since this is an interdisciplinary major, the program assesses the one or more of the following broad learning outcomes, in lieu of focusing on specific subject matter requirements.

Program Description

The Liberal Studies program is an interdisciplinary major, which encompasses a wide variety of areas of knowledge in a multidisciplinary curriculum. The program provides a broad academic program that encourages academic excellence, diversity and inclusive excellence, community, and collaboration. It is a major designed for students who either (i) intend on becoming elementary or special education teachers in California, or (ii) who have an interest in an interdisciplinary course of study. The core of the major is comprised of courses in reading, language and literature, mathematics, natural science, history and social sciences, visual and performing arts, physical education, human development, health and field experience.

The Liberal Studies major is a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing-approved subject matter program that provides teachers with a strong grounding in a wide range of academic disciplines needed to become effective teachers. Beyond careers in teaching, the Liberal Studies major provides excellent preparation for careers in government service, public administration, business, management, community service, counseling, law, librarianship, public health, as well as professional or graduate school.

The Liberal Studies major is a complex program requiring early and continuing contact with an advisor. Students meet with an advisor at least once each semester to provide a hands-on approach to learning. Students must complete 120 units and meet the University foreign language requirement in order to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree. Students are urged to obtain advice as early as possible to avoid delays in the completion of these requirements. The Liberal Studies program director and faculty and staff advisors are located in Lassen Hall 2008, (916) 278-6342.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Minimum Grade Requirement

A minimum grade of "C-" is required in all courses applied to the Liberal Studies major.

Requirements for Areas of Emphasis

The Liberal Studies major requires that students complete an Area of Emphasis. All Areas of Emphasis require a minimum of 9-12 units, 3 of which may overlap with the core course requirements. Students may not combine courses from different areas of emphasis.

Minors may be used in lieu of an Area of Emphasis. Students interested in pursuing a Minor should discuss this option with their Liberal Studies advisor and with an advisor from the Minor program.

Provide a fiscal analysis of the proposed changes:

None. This Area of Emphasis simply takes curriculum previously housed under Multicultural Studies (which was designed to accommodate any bilingual authorization, not only Spanish). This area of emphasis still exists, and does not require fluency/literacy in a foreign language. It is anticipated that those students who are fluent in Spanish, and who plan to seek a bilingual authorization will choose the new Area of Emphasis: Bilingual Studies in Spanish, so that the fiscal impact will be negligible.

How will the above changes be accommodated within the department/College existing fiscal resources?

Teaching Credentials has proposed necessary changes to the EDUC course now required in the new Area of Emphasis that will allow students to complete required coursework as undergraduate students as part of the BA Liberal Studies. Students may still complete this authorization in the Teaching Credentials program, but now have the option of completing the coursework as undergraduates in the BA Liberal Studies.
