As PI of a multi-year Mellon Grant ("Intersectional Studies Collective: Ecologies of Place and Transformative Justice"), convening leadership across the state to establish a statewide Research Center for Rural Communities (RCRC). Housed at the University of Utah, the RCRC will highlight, improve, and extend existing efforts to elevate the state in four key areas: healthcare, education,

business, and art. Our goal is to leverage the diversity of the state for the good of the state. Key Achievements:

- Identified and convened University of Utah experts from Business, Nursing, Fine Arts, Humanities, and Engineering committed to building infrastructure, improving health outcomes, growing entrepreneurship, and celebrating the heritage of rural communities.
- Initiated collaborations with leadership at Utah's higher education institutions (Utah State
 University, Utah Valley University, Snow College, Weber State, Salt Lake Community College,
 Westminster University, Western Governors University, Davis Technical College, Southern Utah
 University, etc.) and the governor's office to organize a statewide summit focused on the
 concerns of diverse rural communities.
- Partnering with five Mellon partners (New York University, Georgia State University, University
 of Illinois at Urbana-Champagne, University of Southern California, and University of Virginia) to
 create RCRC programming for faculty and doctorate students nationally. At Mellon's request,
 submitting a renewal proposal for up to \$1M in September, '24.

Dean, School for Cultural and Social Transformation, 2023-2024

As the Dean of the college, I authored the college's first three-year strategic plan, established an advancement roadmap, recruited an advisory council, appointed Chairs and Associate Deans, and recruited, retained, and hired key faculty and staff to leverage areas of growth. I established the college's first-ever partnerships with the School of Medicine (OB/GYN) and the Huntsman Cancer Institute (HCI) to build upon the college's expertise (related to the social determinants of health), increase joint grant submissions, and grow health-related internships for students. I recruited students through active engagement with the Women's Resource Center, Black Cultural Center, the American Indian Cultural Center, Accessibility, and Athletics. Key Achievements:

- In collaboration with Chairs, faculty, staff, and an invited consultant, created the college's first three-year strategic/budget plan to align with advancement goals. Focused on leveraging resources towards the following: (1) Increasing student retention and graduation rates by tracking data, appointing an Associate Dean for Student Affairs, creating a student ambassador program, launching an active social media presence, augmenting faculty-student interactions, exploring accelerated programs (e.g., 3+3 with the College of Law), and ensuring that our students matched with relevant internships; (2) Reimagining innovation in curriculum to address university priorities around gaming and AI and new needs around online, hybrid, and summer courses; (3) Incentivizing interdisciplinary faculty research through targeted seed grants, and through creating structured pathways for sharing faculty expertise across campus; and (4) Creating unsurpassed societal impact for the state. This involved leveraging relationships with the mayor's office, community organizations (University Neighborhood Partners, Black Chamber of Commerce, Utah Historical Society, Prison Education Project, Genealogical Society of Hispanic America, Encircle), and the health and corporate sectors.
- Led marketing and advancement to align efforts with the strategic/budget plan. Recruited an
 advisory council and alumni board to seek advice and to expand philanthropy. Hired a marketing
 and communications specialist and launched the college's first independent website. Established
 social media presence and published the college's first print magazine (Common Ground) to reengage alumni and donors. Inaugurated onboarding and regular ongoing programming for
 students (including transfers).

- Inaugurated partnerships with the CEO of the Huntsman Cancer Institute and the Dean of the Utah School of Medicine, starting with hiring a tenured faculty focused on preventative cancer research for rural LatinX communities. Collaborated with OB/GYN team (Center for Reproductive Health) to create new curriculum around women's health and women's rights (especially around reproductive justice) and to co-hire a community engagement specialist. The launch of this multi-hire initiative establishes new possibilities for large team-based grant proposals and creates pathways for health-related internships for students. Explored similar partnerships with the Chair of Gaming and the Dean of the College of Business.
- Increased campus-wide and community-wide collaborations to showcase, strengthen, and grow awareness of the college and its offerings. Successfully received budget approval to inaugurate PhD concentration that enables graduate students in any discipline to learn skills in community-engaged research. Partnered with physicians in the School of Medicine and faculty across colleges towards establishing a Pacific Islanders summer bridge program for highschoolers interested in pursuing a PhD or MD. (Outside of Hawaii, Utah has the largest number of Pacific Islanders, most of them Tongan and Samoan.) Guided the Board of Trustees' approval of the first center dedicated to Pacific Islanders ("Center for Pasifika Indigenous Knowledges"). In collaboration with ophthalmologists of Utah's Moran Eye Center, visited Navajo Nation to expand opportunities for high schoolers in rural and underserved areas. Aligned with the Salt Lake City mayor's priorities to grow businesses and convinced the mayor (Erin Mendenhall) to re-engage with the university by speaking at the College's Convocation.
- Steered the college towards operational excellence. Evaluated the ongoing cost of services as
 well as future space requirements. Worked with architects and facilities to plan a dedicated
 wing for future expansion to accommodate new hires and new centers at a cost of over \$300k.
 In alignment with the mission of the university, transitioned the college towards shared services
 for HR, IT, pre- and post-grant support, and student advising.

We received multi-million dollar commitment from Adobe towards the Honors program. Key Achievements:

Co-founded and launched San Jose State's first university-wide Honors and launched funding efforts to support the initiative. Successfully partnered with San Jose State University's VP of Advancement and received initial Adobe funding (\$1M) towards launching Honors in 2022. Evidence of success in the pilot led Adobe to commit another \$1M towards growing the program in 2023. Published an Op-Ed to showcase Honors in EdSource (November, 2022). Submitted multi-year grant application (with faculty from Public Health, Business, and Engineering) to Honda Foundation to support scholarships for Honors students.

- Determined the sustainable baseline budget for the pilot cohort and submitted a five-year plan
 for expansion to the President's Cabinet. Recruited an advisory board comprised of non-profit
 and corporate leaders to provide real-time input on every aspect of Honors: rigorous & relevant
 curriculum, twenty-first century skills, equity-minded disposition, and best outcomes.
- Chaired the Honors team to define the contours of the program, from curriculum and space, course timings and modality, to orientation and assessment, to determining the high-profile public venue (Hammer Theater) for the final TEDx-type Honors symposium. Created buy-in and excitement with internal constituents including deans, chairs, Faculty Senate, and students. Initiated a mentorship infrastructure so every student would benefit from hands-on experiences with external experts. Established a portfolio of high-impact practices such as practicums and internships.
- Partnered with the VP of Marketing to create widespread awareness about Honors across
 multiple stakeholders. Launched signature brand, website, news story, flyer, and other
 collateral for internal and external stakeholders. Showcased interdisciplinarity, design and
 storytelling, leadership, and a global mindset. Embedded Honors' alignment with San Jose
 State University's mission within the President's Fall address. Produced recruitment videos
 for target audiences in the region and across the US, developed an inclusive application
 process, and successfully recruited a cross-disciplinary pilot group.
- Actively sought to diversify Honors applicants by collaborating with the VP of Student Affairs, requesting faculty referrals from Deans across all nine colleges, and by working one on one with community colleges, cultural centers, and student groups. Designed customized information sessions and presented at the athletic complex and at cultural centers (Black Leadership Opportunity Center, Chicanx/Latinx, PRIDE, Veterans Resource Center, Undocu Center) to encourage the widest student involvement. Instituted a one-stop "concierge-style" hub for Honors students by working closely with Career Services, Advising, Information Technology, Registrar, and the Bursar's Office.
- Developed and implemented advising and other initiatives (e.g., Honors homeroom) to successfully promote a positive student experience leading to retention and post-graduation success. Assessed current university "student success" activities with the goal of enhancing the ease of access for Honors students.

I served as the primary contact for retention, promotion, and tenure standards, facilitated interdisciplinary collaborations across departments, advocated successfully for increasing faculty research funding, and created venues to encourage collaborative research across 300 faculty in the College of Social Science. Converted unused computer lab to a state-of-the-art research hub and a venue for ongoing community, faculty, and student collaborations. Key Achievements:

Created processes and policies to encourage, validate, and showcase faculty research.
 Successfully advocated for and established an annual budget (\$20k) to increase institutional support for just-in-time faculty needs and travel and chaired the committee that awarded this funding. Launched the first-ever College of Social Science research board consisting of faculty

and administrators to review and recommend best policies for supporting applications for large grants, starting at \$100k. Advanced university recognition by ensuring that faculty expertise was available via searchable database. This also promoted California-wide collaborations.

- Pioneered an interdisciplinary Dean's Symposium to accelerate research collaborations across
 disciplines on issues such as early childhood education and urbanization. Launched campaign to
 advertise widely to students, faculty, and staff across all divisions and invited Provost to offer
 welcome. This Symposium has since become integral to the College of Social Science, drawing
 wide university-wide support.
- Successfully coached tenure-track faculty to prepare them for San Jose State University's
 expectations for reappointment, tenure, and promotion. Developed an advising and mentoring
 program for newly hired and mid-career faculty in the College of Social Science. Supported and
 handled faculty concerns related to personnel, advising, and teaching. Created training
 workshops so new faculty could acquire expertise in hybrid teaching. Launched biweekly
 newsletter so faculty could share achievements, learn about research or summer funds, and
 announce important upcoming events.
- Spearheaded a review to systematically assess M.A. programs across all departments in the College of Social Science to analyze patterns of enrollment, graduation rates, and career choices of graduates.
- Collaborated with Chairs, faculty, and community partners to set up a new interdisciplinary hub
