

## Placements

## **General information**

- Placements are for the entire school year
- PE candidate placements are managed by the PE Program Coordinator Dr. Craig Tacla ctacla@csus.edu
- Music placements are managed by Music Program Coordinator Dr. Clay Redfield redfield@csus.edu
- Any placement changes are allowed in spring for internships only (see below and next slide on internships)
- Candidates may serve as a substitute and must follow/meet all requirements in the Single Subject Field Handbook (see page 18)
- Internships are allowed once candidates successfully complete the first semester of the program and are coordinated between schools and program faculty – candidates do not initiate this process—and must be approved by the supervisor and the field coordinator – <u>petebenitti@csus.edu</u>



# What is Field Experience?

- Field Experience is a general term that applies to the Fall and includes:
  - Observations (in-person) at school sites
  - Practice working with small groups or individual students
  - Opportunities to teach, co-teach and plan lessons
  - Attend and participate in meetings, events and extracurricular activities
  - Formal Student Teaching that continues in the Spring
- Field Experience provides the opportunity to practice the theories and strategies learned in university coursework

## General Candidate Responsibilities

## **Starting Monday-**

- Arrive at your placement early
- Be prepared to fully engage in whatever your responsibilities are (materials, lesson plans, etc.); Observe!!! Take notes!
- Learn and follow all school policies, practices, procedures and rules
- Dress and act professionally
- Attend department meetings and/or school-wide events (Back to School Night, open house, conferences, etc.) when possible (cannot miss Sac State classes!)
- Maintain a Student Teaching EBinder Per page 15 of the field handbook, this will be in electronic format; your University Supervisor will provide preferred format
- Read the handbooks, <u>Policy & Procedures</u> and especially the <u>Single Subject Field</u> Handbook

# Field Placement Support

## Cooperating Teacher (CT)

The in-service teacher who collaborates with and mentors the candidate

## University Supervisor (US)

The faculty member who evaluates the candidate's performance in the host classroom and acts as a liaison between university and placement

## Field Coordinator

The faculty member who supports and oversees candidate placements, university supervisors, and internships



# Required to Start in the Field

- Teacher Candidates (TCs) must have their Certificate of Clearance (CoC) in order to start in the field. These can be submitted by emailing coe-cred@csus.edu. TCs cannot start in their placements until they've been cleared by the district.
- TCs must meet Subject Matter Competency (pass CSETs) by January 2025 in order to move to student teaching (this is a hard deadline). If SMC is not met by this time, TCs will have to extend the program. TCs should check their csus emails daily - especially junk mail and SPAM folders.
- Spring internships allow a TC to serve as the teacher of record while getting paid by the
  district to complete Student Teaching. Internships are an option to pursue in TCs' second
  (or after) semester. Spring internships are arranged between the school that is interested in
  hiring the TC as an intern and the SS Field Coordinator per the <u>Guidelines for Intern</u>

# Master's Degree

Year 1 is the Credential Year

 Year 2 is the Master's Year (you have up to 7 years from admission to come back for the Master's year)

 NOTE: Courses that are required as part of the Master of Arts in Teaching require a grade of B or better in order to be used to satisfy the requirements of the Master's degree. (200 Level Courses)




## Listening in Transformational Coaching

Listening is a skill; you can train yourself to do this, and you will get better with practice. Deep listening is hard to do. At first, it can feel very strange, uncomfortably empty and quiet, unlike anything you've ever experienced. But it is the most effective tool you'll use in coaching. When you are listening deeply, you stop thinking – your own mental chatter is quiet. When you are listening very deeply to another person, your own thoughts and concerns quiet down and your ego naps in a corner of your mind. This creates a tremendous space for your client to explore their own issues. You can support and guide that exploration through the questions you ask. Once you've created a clear, safe, nonjudgmental field, there is plenty of space for clients to wander around their own mind, exploring their beliefs, their blocks, and their goals and how to fulfill them." (p. 148-149)

## 3 Listening Strategies:

- 1. Quiet Listening "hold a space" "so that people can unravel what's going on for them" (p. 150)
- 2. Intentional Listening listen to their "assumptions, interpretations, and underlying beliefs" AND to "what is not said" (p. 151)
- **3. Collect Stories** "notice patterns running through their narratives" (p. 152)




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# Dyads - Practice Listening
