The Integrative Anthropology concentration introduces students to the fundamentals of archaeological, biological, sociocultural and linguistic anthropology. It provides a well rounded and holistic view of the discipline through coverage of the diverse lines of inquiry and evidence that anthropologists use to explore the human condition. This concentration is grounded in creative, critical, and analytical thinking, and prepares students for a diverse range of career paths, from the private sector and corporate jobs to those in the government and non-profit sectors. It also prepares students for postgraduate education.
