Course Description

This is a combined section GERO 121/221 sections 1 & 2,

undergraduate and master student asynchronous course, with optional course meetings (TBA). You will be paired in the first few weeks of this course, with a mentor from the Renaissance Society, to complete several of the assignments in this course. You will connect with your mentor possibly in person or Zoom. A detailed introduction video is uploaded in Canvas explaining the course. This is an asynchronous course that is an in-depth, interdisciplinary, and holistic exploration of health promotion and adaptation paradigms that facilitate optimal and productive longevity. Hardiness and self-efficacy theories along with expectations and experiences enhancing quality of life are explored. Interactions among such variables as activity, diet, exercise, healthcare, work/leisure, attitudes/beliefs, humor, living environments, spirituality, and social networks are investigated within the contexts of gender, economic, and cultural perspectives.

Personal Biosketch Paper-Health Contract plus three-month calendar. This paper you will complete on yourself. There are a few components on this paper, so please read all directions in Canvas.

Mentor Reflection (4) Papers. These writing assignments reflect your mentor's interview questions as you narrate their life stories through the course.

Mentor Student Agreement Signature form. This is a contract that you will need to sign. Your mentor will be sent a form as well.

Discussion Posts with one peer thoughtful reply within 48 hours after initial post.
