Text: A First Course in Differential Equations with Modeling Applications, by Zill, Cengage Learning, 11th Edition, 2018. We will not be using WebAssign for homework. An e-book is acceptable, and you don't need to bring your text to class

Catalog Description: First order differential equations, second order differential equations with constant coefficients. Laplace transforms, small systems of linear differential equations, numerical methods, introduction to second order differential equations with variable coefficients.

Prerequisite: Math 31.

Attendance: You need to attend regularly to succeed in this or any college course. I will take attendance, but it will not count towards your course grade.

Messages and Announcements: I send messages to the class and to individual students through My Sac State. You are responsible for reading these messages and for any announcements made in class.

Homework: Homework is a vital part of the learning process. If you don't do the homework, you will likely not pass the course. Homework problems for a section in the text are assigned the day we finish that section in class. Homework problem numbers will be posted on Canvas.

I will not collect or grade homework because all solutions are available online. However, starting the second week of class we will have a daily homework quiz except on exam days. The quiz will consist of one problem from the previous week's assigned homework and will be given at the beginning of class. Your cumulative quiz score, with the lowest score dropped, will count as one midterm exam. There will be no make-up quizzes. Quiz dates and coverage are posted on Canvas.

Note: We will be covering a semester's worth of material in six weeks, making this equivalent a 7.5-unit course. You can expect to spend up to 15 hours per week outside of class doing homework and studying for this course.

Exams/Grading: In addition to the homework quizzes (1/6 of your course grade), we will have 4 midterm exams (each 1/6 of your grade), and a comprehensive final (1/6 of your grade). Your final exam score, if it is higher, will replace your lowest midterm exam score. Grading scale: A: [90-100%], B: [80-90%), C: [70-80%), D: [60-70%), F: <60%, with +/-grades within those intervals. Please see Canvas for the exam rules and policies.

Save your midterm exams. They will serve as a study guide for the final exam.

Calculators: Calculators will not be needed or allowed during exams.

Make-up Exams: If you are unable to take an exam with the class, your score on the final exam will replace the zero of the (first) missed exam. See the Exam Rules and Policies document on Canvas.

Math Lab: The Math Lab is a tutoring center designed to assist students enrolled in lower division mathematics and statistics courses.
