Monday 11/29, Wednesday 12/1, Monday 12/6, and Wednesday 12/8, Final Drawing Project. Attendance required. There will be no make-ups. All work will be done in class. The final drawing will count as two daily assignments. Materials required: 1 sheet Arches Cover paper. Compressed charcoal, (no vine charcoal). Pink pearl, kneaded rubber, and pencil erasers. Charcoal pencil and chamois or soft cloth for rubbing strongly recommended.

Wednesday, 12/1: Outside project, two page paper, and all overdue projects due.

Wednesday, 12/8, Final Quiz, beginning of class: The quiz will have 20 multiple choice questions (each question has 5 choices, which include "all of the above" and "none of the above") on the following terms: **Wet-in-wet** Adding wet medium to wet paper.

<u>Dry brush</u> Using as little liquid as possible in the brush to achieve a dry, rough texture. <u>Design Principles</u>

- 1. Harmony (Unity): Agreement among the art elements.
- 2. Art Elements: Line, color, space, light, volume, value, texture, time and motion.
- 3. Variety provides interest or contrast to sameness. Variety is achieved by:
 - A. Changing aspects of an element (ex. same shape, different size or value)
 - B. Holding one or two elements constant & changing others (ex. all round shapes, but different values or colors).
 - C. Transition of one element into another (ex. dark grades into light, smooth texture changes into rough).
 - D. Contrast two different elements juxtaposed so we compare difference (ex. strong dark next to strong light).
- 3. Unity is achieved by:
 - A. Repetition of kind of line, shapes, etc.
 - B. Proximity or grouping of forms.
 - C. Continuation of contour or edge from form to form.
 - D. Careful placement so the eye connects parts (ex. triangular composition).
- 4. **Balance**: Visual scale of weights, it is felt optically. Consider the position and placement of information on the picture plane as well as the size and proportion.
- 5. **Movement/Rhythm:** It is implied by placement, directional lines, contour edges. Indicates the path the viewer's eye must travel though the picture plane, a sense of visual cadence is developed.
- 6. **Economy:** Use only what works to support the whole, the less complicated the more successful the composition. "LESS IS MORE!"

<u>Five Types of Perspective</u> Please refer to the reading assignment: Chapter 8, in <u>Drawing, A Contemporary Approach</u> (Library Reserve) and your sketchbook notes for definitions.

- 1. Linear (includes 1, 2, & 3 point perspectives)
- 2. Aerial (atmospheric)
- 3. Foreshortening
- 4. Multiple
- 5. Stacked
