Discussion

- In general, demographics of students who don't get their financial aid application in on time or don't complete their file are comparable to the general Sac State population. There are just two areas that show some discrepancy.
- The most striking discrepancy is in the percentage of incomplete files for seniors (47%), while seniors represent only 36% of the campus population.
- 53% of the incomplete applications belonged to Pell-eligible students, while only 42% of Sac State students overall were Pell-eligible in Fall 2023.
- These areas of discrepancy indicate student populations that may benefit from more proactive outreach by the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships to encourage them to submit their paperwork and offer technical assistance.

Assessment Question #2: How is the Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) percentage changing over time, and to what extent are improvements being made in the Office of Financial Aid impacting that?

Discussion

The percentage of students not meeting SAP fell from 4.9% in Fall 2019 to 3.3% in Fall 2023. In that time, the Office of Financial Aid implemented a reduced Satisfactory Pace Standard and opened up SAP Appeals for those that had also appealed for Fall semester. It appears those changes have improved outcomes for students and allowed more students to keep their financial aid by meeting satisfactory academic progress.
